### **English: Reading**

Children are exposed to a wide range of texts covering fiction genres, non-fiction and poetry. Texts are varied in length and can be a class novel over the whole half term or shorter texts which can be explored in a week. We teach reading through the explicit teaching of new vocabulary and background knowledge first. The children then build on their fluency by reading aloud extracts and text every single day. The children read aloud every day and discuss the texts in rich, open discussions with both their teacher and their peers before completing a range of varied comprehension questions focusing on key skills such as retrieval, inference, predictions and reasoning.

#### **English: Writing**

Our core reading texts and topics form the basis for much of our independent writing units and are the 'hook' to grab the imagination of our writers. During this half term we will continue to explore different fiction and non-fiction texts as well as poetry. The children will explore the features of these texts by looking at examples before planning and then writing their own independently. Spelling, Grammar and Handwriting lessons are taught discreetly with children given regular time throughout the week to practice. We will write newspaper reports and a balanced argument linked to our knowledge of Ancient Greece. We will also write letters and character and setting descriptions based on our class book *Grimwood*.

We read every day through our reading lessons, class novel, topic related books and other stories through reading for pleasure. Some of the texts we will explore this half term include:

## **Statistics**

The children will explore time and learn to tell the time using both using analogue and digital clocks with a focus on am and pm to the nearest 5 minutes.

In our shape unit, children are introduced to the concept of angles for the first time. In Year 2, they described turns as quarter, half, three-quarter and full turns. They will now recognise angles as describing the size of a turn and compare angles to explore those greater than and smaller than a right angle. They will then measure and draw angles accurately and identify parallel and perpendicular lines. The children will recognise and describe 2D and 3D shapes; they will draw 2D polygons and make 3D shapes.

In statistics, children will lean to interpret and draw pictograms and bar charts and they will collect and represent data.

## Science:

### Animals including humans

In this unit, the children will understand that humans get their nutrition from what they eat and know that there are five food groups: fruit and vegetables, carbohydrates and starches, dairy, protein and sugars and fats. The children will learn that nutrition involves drinking enough water and eating a balanced diet. They will also learn that a human skeleton is made up of bone and grows as we grow.

## Computing: Events and actions

This unit explores the links between events and actions, whilst consolidating prior learning relating to sequencing. Children will begin by moving a sprite in four directions and they will then explore movement within the context of a maze before designing and coding their own maze tracing program.
