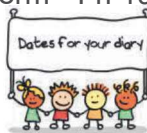
What would you like to achieve when you leave school?

Homework - In addition to spellings and reading, children will bring home tasks linked to in class learning. Initially this will have a letter formation focus.

English: Phonics & Reading

Children are grouped according to their next steps and will begin this half term in their newly assigned groups. In phonics sessions children will continue to learn new/review Speed Sounds and how to apply these to reading and spelling.

Reading sessions are based on a shared RWI text. This text is usually changed weekly, once a range of tasks and activities have been completed. These tasks enable children to:

- practice focus Speed Sounds
- develop vocabulary and learn the meaning of new words
- develop sight reading of decodable and common tricky words
- enjoy listening to stories read aloud
- join in with adults reading the story and improve reading fluency and expression
- think about what is happening in the story
- find answers to questions within the text
- read with a storyteller's voice
- 'Magpie' words from texts to use in their own writing
- share linked texts and make links between stories, characters and settings.

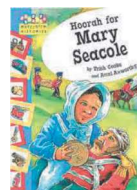
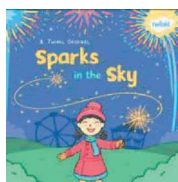
English: Writing

Through a variety of activities across the curriculum, children will apply their phonic knowledge and taught spelling rules to compose labels, captions and simple sentences for a range of purposes, including poems; factual texts; diary entries in role and story retells.

They will continue to develop their understanding of sentence structure using hold/build a sentence tasks; learn to apply capital letters correctly to start sentences as well as for names and places and use simple punctuation (. ! ?) to finish sentences. In addition, they will develop proof reading skills, spotting and correcting mistakes in sentences.

Spelling lessons will introduce children to new spelling rules and patterns each week. Please see the table at the end of this document to help you support your child at home too.

We read stories every day from a range of picture books, often linked to our theme. Some of the texts focused on this half term include:



We also love to share books from home. Please feel free to bring in your favourites!

Maths: Addition and subtraction

Using numbers to 10 small steps will include: Write number sentences; Fact families – addition facts; Number bonds within 10; Addition – add together and add more; Addition problems; Find a part; Subtraction – find a part; Fact families – the eight facts; Subtraction – take away/cross out (How many left?); Take away (How many left?); Subtraction on a number line.

Shape

Small steps will include: Recognise and name 3-D shapes; Sort 3-D shapes; Recognise and name 2-D shapes; Sort 2-D shapes; Patterns with 2-D and 3-D shapes.

Art: We will complete our line and shape work, creating Paul Klee inspired self-portraits before starting our DT project.

DT: Structures (Windmills)

Children will learn and develop new structural skills through the theme of 'windmills'. They will learn that a structure is something built for a reason; the importance of stable structures and how to achieve this to ensure they do not topple. They will use tools and equipment to make sails for windmills and learn how to attach them effectively, understanding that the sails or blades of a windmill are moved by the wind to generate power.

Science: Properties of materials

Through this unit of work, children will learn to distinguish between an object and the material from which it is made. They will be able to identify and name everyday materials, including wood, plastic, metal, glass, water and rock as well as brick, paper, elastic and foil. They will describe and compare the physical properties of these materials and carry out simple investigations to test how suitable some of these materials would be to make an umbrella and curtains. They will need to consider how the objects are used and the key properties of the materials that will make them suitable.

Music: Charanga

Rhythm in the Way We Walk (Reggae)
The Banana Rap (Hip Hop)

Through this unit of work, children build on their understanding of pulse as the heartbeat of a song and begin to understand what is meant by 'pitch'. They will play a variety of musical games, including moving to the pulse, clapping rhythms and singing. They will learn and sing two new songs alongside listening to and appraising 'The Planets, Mars' by Gustav Holst and 'Tubular Bells' by Mike Oldfield in the first half of the unit and 'Happy' by Pharrell Williams and 'When I'm 64' by The Beatles in the second half.

Computing: E-Safety – Usernames and Passwords

Children will further develop their understanding of how to become responsible users of technology. They will use their own individual usernames and passwords and learn how to log on to the school network and the online platform, School360. These will be shared so that children can access School360 at home too.

Digital Painting

Once children can log on to the School360 platform they will be introduced to the digital painting programs and tools to create pictures linked to other subject areas.

History: Florence Nightingale & Mary Seacole 1800s

Children will learn all about Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole, who they were, what they did and why they are still so famous today. They will learn about their upbringing in the 1800s and a little about the differences between those from wealthy and poor families. We will largely focus on Florence and Mary's determination and resilience in their quests to help others and, with regards to Florence, to educate people on the importance of cleanliness and hygiene in hospitals and the impact she had on the world of nursing.

PE: Dance

PE will be led by Liam, our visiting coach from Active Future. The overall objective in our PE lessons this half term is for children to be able to perform and describe dances using simple movement patterns. They will achieve this through a series of sessions that explore four of the six principles of dance: travelling, turning, jumping and stillness and apply these to music.

Children will have opportunities to work independently and in pairs. Throughout sessions children will be developing their technical vocabulary and encouraged to describe dances and notice when the key principles have been shown in their own and others' performances.

PSHCE: Zones of Regulation

Children will become familiar with and begin to use the vocabulary associated with their emotions, feelings and thoughts within each of the four coloured 'zones'. They will begin to identify which zone they are in at any given time and select which strategies to use to enable them to begin to self-regulate when they are in an 'unexpected' zone for learning.

Virtues

Courage – The Big Bag of Worries. Learning to spot courage and bravery in ourselves and others.

Kindness – The Book of Kindness. Explore ways in which we can show kindness to ourselves, others and animals.

Reflection – Which virtues do we feel we are good at or need to practice further?

RE: Christianity – Why does Christmas matter to Christians?

RE lessons this half term will be taught by Mrs McAthey. In these sessions children will begin to recognise that stories of Jesus' life come from the Gospels and be able to give a clear, simple account of the story of Jesus' birth and why Jesus is important for Christians.

They will begin to be able to give examples of ways in which Christians use the story of the Nativity to guide their beliefs and actions at Christmas.

Children will be encouraged to think, talk and ask questions about Christmas for Christians and for people who are not Christians as well as decide what they personally have to be thankful for, giving a reason for their ideas.

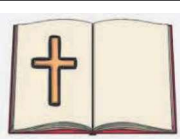
Respect
